SECTION - A

(Reading - 20 Marks)

The Great Wall of China is said to be one structure built by man on earth which would be visible to observers on the moon. It covers a distance of 1,500 miles as the crow flies. From the Liaotung Peninsula westward to the last fortress in Central Asia, it crosses the northern province of China.

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In the eastern section, its height varies from 15-30 feet and its width from about 25 feet at the bottom to 15 feet at the top, where there is a pathway wide enough for six horsemen to ride side by side protected by parapets. When the wall was first built, it had about 25,000 towers each 40 feet square and 40 feet high projecting from it every few hundred yards, with holes from which the defenders could shoot at attackers. There are also many watch-towers on the enemy side, outside the wall on hilltops or passes. These and the towers of the wall were used for signalling with smoke or flags by day and with fire at night.

The great Emperor Shih Haung Ti joined three earlier frontier walls to form a great wall to act as a boundary between China and the north, and keep out the feared nomads of the Mongolian Steppes. The wall was designed to strengthen the nation's defences. Later it became in Ming times, a substitute for a strong army and state.

SAVE THE GIRL CHILD

Female Foeticide is a blot on society welcome that Prime Minister Manmohan Singh's call to start a mass movement against female foeticide is, it is also an indicator how serious the problem has become. It must be extremely painful for the Prime Minister to know that his home state is almost at the top of those where this inhuman practice is still on. Some of the villages are very well identified and yet precious little is done about it. The Prime Minister is also right in admitting that legislation can just do so much in the matter. What is necessary is that such a murder of a girl child should evoke revulsion in society. Isn't it strange that community panchayats that issue irrational diktats on sundry issues tend to overlook this abominable practice?

Over the years, laws have been made stricter and the punishment too is more stringent now. But since many people manage to evade punishment, others too feel inclined to take the risk. Just look at the way sex determination tests go on despite a stiff ban on them. Only if the message goes out loud and clear that nobody who dares to snuff out the life of a female foetus would escape gallows would the practice end. Not all parents kill their daughters because they hate them. Many are forced to take the extreme step only because they know it from experience that if she survives her life will be worse than death. To that extent, all family members and relatives who give second grade treatment to a girl and everyone who demands dowry are encouraging foeticide. Once the parents are certain that their girl child would not have to undergo untold miseries all her life, most of them if not all would refrain from killing the flesh and blood of their own. After all, this must be an impossible thing to do for a majority of them.
