Word on the street travels afar, and a queue of impatient readers winds its way around Mall Road. Meeting Ruskin is a must in Mussoorie. He's bit like Santa this evening, sitting on a chair, posing with readers and signing books. He smiles every time, always has something to say - a thank you, an anecdote and that delightful laughter that rumbles in his belly before escaping from his mouth in soft chuckles.

It comes easily and one realises that he truly enjoys being amongst his readers - young and old, pushy and shy, teenage boys who keep throwing glances his way and finally hunker over. He notices their discomfort and with the confidence of a pro puts them at ease. And then the unanticipated; a hulking man sidles up to Ruskin for a photo op. There must be a child coming along and we wait to capture the image. But no, it is only him, he read Ruskin in school he says and holds a book out shyly. There is indeed one more Bond who reduces men to boys, and he isn't fictional!

At the age of 20, he won the John Llewellyn Rhys Prize. The award with its handsome 50 pound payout, meant he could buy a one-way ticket to India. Before leaving he recalls a visit to the BBC studio, where a distinguished man passed by him with a short greeting. It was Graham Greene! This helped him decide what kind of writer he wanted to be. The large feet of the sparrow are used for scratching seeds. Adult sparrows mainly eat seeds.

Sparrows can be found almost anywhere there are humans. Some species of sparrows prefer to live in deserts, prairies, swamps, marshes, forests, and other bushy areas. Some sparrows in northern North America will migrate south in winter, although most stay in one area year-round. The older adult males of the migrating sparrows usually spend their winters near their breeding area. Many people throughout the world enjoy these delightful birds.
