The Chennai seacoast is a breeding ground for the endangered Olive Ridley turtles. The 'Turtle Walk' is an initiative aimed at educating the fishing community and the general public living near the beach on the need to protect Oliver Ridley turtle and its turtle nests.

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During the night, under normal conditions, the sea is a brighter source of light than the land. But now with urbanization and nighttime lighting, the shore is brighter than the sea at night. This distracts the Olive Ridley turtles that come ashore to lay eggs. Even the hatchlings get distracted. Instead of going in the direction of the sea, the hatchlings and adults stray towards human habitations.

The volunteers, during their walk, begin their enthusiastic search for turtles and their egg-laden nests. Some may be lucky enough to witness at close quarters, a large Turtle come ashore, dig its nest in the sand, lay eggs, cover the nest, and then walk back into the sea. The volunteers trace many such nests and dig out the Turtle eggs. While newborns are prone to attack by crows and dogs, adult trutles face the threat of being run over by vehicles. Eggs are collected and carried back to the hatchery where they would be kept safely for hatching, and once hatched, released into the sea. They also rescue lone baby turtles, which could have been hatched from one of the undiscovered nests, and had strayed away on account of the distracting lights on the shore. They carried them to the sea, and let them free in the water. The seven km walk on the beach lasts four hours.

#### 3. Read the following passage carefully.

Kick boxing, as it was known by the name of "Muaythai", originated as the national sport of Thai society, with competitions held as early as 1257—1377 AD. You might also say that Muaythai was the sport of kings in its early days. King Pha Chao Sua was so involved in the sport he used to disguise himself as a commoner to participate. He was further so supportive of the sport he ordered his army to be trained in the art, and interest swelled.

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Certainly this may have given Mauythai enormous new attention and status to survive in history over the next centuries.

In 1921, although the fighting style had not changed, new transformations were applied with the inclusion and standardization of the 20 Glove 20ft roped ring. Gloves were introduced as standard in 1923 by order of the police of the interior ministry. By the 1930s groin protection was introduced. International enthusiasm grew slowly; it was as late as 1995 when the first world Amateur Muay Thai Championships were held.

As a martial art, there is very little equipment required of participants, although it has come a long way since the early days.

Kick boxers will use hand wraps, i.e. pieces of cloth to wrap around their hand beneath gloves. Today the gloves are much thicker for the protection of an opponent, but light gloves are also available for training against bags. Shin guards, and groin protectors are also worn. Female boxers may choose to wear a chest or torso protector, although some discussion about these claim they often do more hurt than give protection.

Certainly a grading system exists today as with other martial arts. Grading and competitions are held regularly. The grades, called belts, are from white-red-yellow, and then continue to orange—green—purple and blue—brown—black.

You continue to further levels beyond black as a master of the art. Kick boxing as all martial arts, is suitable for everyone from children, to women and men. Certainly kick boxing training is an ideal exercise that can be performed at your own individual pace and ability. Many classes are offered as either contact or non contact training.

If you were ever a Girl Scout or Boy Scout as a kid, you learned about leave no trace and preserving the purity of outdoors.

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There are seven simple tips to remember. Firstly know what the regulations are in the area you will be camping and climbing. Prepare for any emergencies, changes in climate and other hazards. Repackage food to minimize waste and take your trash home with you.

Remember to only drive and park on trails with rock, gravel, or dry grass. Show consideration for other climbers, walkers or the landowner. In popular camping areas try to concentrate activity on trails, campsites and where vegetation is absent.

In pristine areas, try to disperse the creation of campsites and trails. You should also avoid places where wear from campers is beginning to take place. There can be some exceptions to this principle of leave no trace, especially if there are only designated places to camp.

Disposing your waste is important. Whatever you pack in, pack it out. Inspect your campsite for trash and food. Pack out all of your trash, leftover food and litter—in fact, pack out any other litter that is there whether it is yours or not.

Preserve and leave behind what you find. Look but don't touch cultural or historical artefacts. Do not climb historical or cultural structures. Leave rocks and plants how you found them. Avoid introducing anything that is non-native to the area.

It is important to minimize campfire impacts keep fires small, and burn your fires completely out and scatter cooled ashes. Respect the wild life of the area by observing them from a distance and not threatening them in any way.
