Journalist - turned author Pinki Virani opened our eyes to a deeply painful truth - sexual abuse of children in middle and upper-class Indian homes. Her book Bitter chocolate (Penguin 2000) revealed how rampant and perilous the crime is. It also dealt with how we Indians live in denial, believing that such sin are not the norm in our culture (Indeed, a nationwide study published in 2007 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development describes child sexual abuse to be commonplace. In Bitter chocolate award winning Virani Poignantly talks of her own trauma of childhood incest, and underlines the importance of children being encouraged to speak up in order to overcome the shock and harm.

Earlier, Virani's first book, the award wining Aruna's story, documented the tragedy of a nurse, who has been in a semi - comatose state since 1973, after she was raped by a hospital employee while being strangled with a chain. In these 36 years of losing her speech, sight and movement, Aruna Shanbaug now 61, is being kept in a persistent vegetative state.

In the early 1980s, Pinki Virani started out as journalist with The Times of India 'group'. She has been editor of 'Mid Day' a Mumbai afternoon newspaper, and a special correspondent with 'Sunday'. She is married to Shankar Aiyar, also, and veteran journalist and editor Virani's fourth and most recent book, 'Deaf Heaven' (Harper Collins), is also her first work of fiction. It's been described by Khushwant Singh as "igenuously structured".

Like millions of other teenagers my 14 - years old daughter Kitty is often to be found on sofa, laptop on her knees, checking facts for the essay she's writing. The TV is on and occasionally she scrolls through Face Book. She sends SMS's, makes calls on her mobile and takes her iPod headset on and off.

To me - and the most other parents this seems an impossible way to work. 'How can you think with all noise?" we yell. Home work used to be something to be done in silence with all distractions firmly removed . Yet for Kitty and her peers this is normal. The question a lot of experts are now asking is; how is this way of working affecting their brains?

Kitty and her friends aren't the only ones exposed daily to terabytes of information. Research shows that office workers are interrupted every three minutes by their phones, computers or colleagues. Self styled "road warriors" are permanently reachable through their mobiles while they simultaneously (and illegally) drive, talk and listen to the radio. Some fed silence and undivided attention have become the most precious commodities in the world.

But this isn't an old jogey moan at newfangled inventions. In the last few years there has been a revolution in the scientists understanding of what the brain can do and how it can be changed by the world around us. Text books more than a decade old will tell you that you die with the same brain you were born with; that growing new brain cells is impossible. But "High-tech. Scanners have revealed that the brain is constantly changing" says Alvaro Fernandes, "cells die off, but new ones are created all the time. These can be wired up in new and different ways depending what your brain is doing .

But an even more dramatic break through came last year. If you train using right software program it's possible to expand your working memory the human equivalent of computer Ram.
